WHAT DO YOU MEAN,
“CONFERENCE APPROVED?”

When you see the words **“This is A.A. General Service Conference-Approved Literature,”** it means only one thing: such a publication represents the broadest possible consensus of A.A. thinking. It is not just one small locality’s interpretation, nor the ideas of only one member.

As far as humanly possible, the statement says, in effect, “This piece reflects the spectrum of opinion of our whole fellowship.” Any such material has been very carefully prepared under the close scrutiny of the General Service Office staff, of the appropriate trustees’ and Conference committees, and of our General Service Conference itself, expressing the group conscience of A.A. as a whole.

It does not mean the Conference **disapproves** of any other publications. Many local A.A. central offices and areas publish their own meeting lists, newsletters, and other

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DELEGATE’S CORNER

Four years ago, I had an experience that changed my life and sobriety in such a way I had to write about it and share my salvation with those I was in hell with. Of course, those were fellows in A.A.; those whose lives have been changed by the power of the Program and had been given the gift of recovery. I thought that since PRAASA is coming up in about a month, that this might be another great time to share it with the Area in this first edition of the new newsletter. I hope some of you will find what I have found here in General Service. Here it is as written after the vent in 2008.

“I have been sober since February, 1993, and I have not experienced what I experienced in, of all places, Anchorage, Alaska last weekend. I have taken the Steps. I have taken scores of

people through the steps. I have gone to countless meetings and done a lot of service...Secretary, coffee maker, greeter, etc. I have seen the light come on, as well as seen it go out in people over the past fifteen years. But what I saw, heard and felt in Alaska will have a lasting impression on my life and on my recovery forever.

PRAASA which stands for, Pacific Region Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly, is held once a year in a host city, where GSR's, DCM's, DCMC's, Delegates, Past Delegates, Committee Chairs, and other Service position people meet to discuss ideas and experience about service. Service Assembly? Who wants to get with a bunch of dried up AAs and talk about service? I have heard about this event for years, and always judged its effectiveness against that of just going to a meeting and sharing solution. I realized how small I have been making myself with that kind of thinking.

Many gathered, there, to exchange ideas and solutions that they have found to be effective as they have served their various areas. One trusted servant, a lady who lived 200 miles away in little Russia town, had to travel half way around the world just to get there for this experience. From her hometown, she traveled to Moscow. Then, from Moscow to Atlanta, Georgia. From Atlanta to Seattle and from there, she was able to get to Anchorage...200 miles away from her home. We all cried!

My only concern for years has been that I know someone is being born today who will need A.A. in 20 years, and I just want A.A. to be there. But after this experience, I know there are many working to make that dream a

reality. I have pages and pages of notes, numbers, directories and new friends from all around the Pacific Region, and a new kindled fire for Alcoholics Anonymous.

I have an immense gratitude for the knowledge that lives will be affected...lives will be saved...lives will become fed by that Power that presides over us all. This Assembly of Alcoholics represented the vine, rooted and nurtured in the Spirit of Love and Service that connects all AA members to one and other in the most divine way. These people humbly gathered to discuss how we can better serve AA, with care, gratitude, and a sense of service, under the guidance of God as He expresses Himself in our collective consciousness.

I thank those of you who are in service, who have gently nudged me into this new chamber in my recovery...the Chamber of General Service! My life has been impacted and will continue as I decompress over the next few weeks. I am truly blessed to be in an area of the country where we have such a strong commitment to service. Through H&I, Intergroup and General Service. I know the message is getting to the still sick alcoholic who wants to recover. I thank each and every one of you who serve A.A. so that A.A. can serve God.

(God, I love AA and Service. I hope to see many of you in Washington. I hope many of our Districts and Groups will see the validity of participation in this event and will make sure that the representatives that should be there will be there. As a matter of fact, my Home Group actually puts \$7.00 aside each week so that at the end of the year we have \$350 to

To answer that question was Cesar F., Area Chair and past Area Registrar. Cesar made reference to *The A.A. Service Manual*, page S45, which states in part "*In some areas, Registrars now develop and maintain records of all groups in the Area, including group names, meeting locations, times and G.S.R. or group contact.*" Afterwards, Cesar took questions.

This brought us to the lunch break. Pizza, salad and sodas mixed with quality association and the making of new friends within the museum-like environment at the Archives, I couldn't help but think about what sobriety has brought me to: Being of Service to Fellow Alcoholics.

After lunch the Workshop continued with a large screen Power Point "Demonstration and Explanation of Entering Area 09 Information into GSO/FNV (Fellowship New Vision)." This was presented by Raul C., our new current Area Registrar. (Raul's personal story can be read in the Spanish Edition of the Big Book.) and Michael M., our immediate past Area Registrar. Questions and answers followed.

The Workshop closed with a "Sharing Session" where we were asked: Was this beneficial? How can we improve this workshop?

publications. Many local A.A. central offices and areas publish their own meeting lists, newsletters, and other material. A.A. as a whole does not oppose these, any more than A.A. disapproves of the Bible or books on health or any other publications from any source that A.A.'s find helpful. What any A.A. member reads is of no business of G.S.O. or of the Conference. But when you see the [the words "conference approved"], you can be sure the material has been through often tediously slow, sometimes tortuous screenings and revisions by the necessary committees and the Conference.

It is important that all Conference-approved A.A. material is exhibited clearly separate from any other publications. If new members or visitors see religious or medical pamphlets or other material about alcoholism mixed up with A.A. literature, they can become terribly confused about A.A. We are not affiliated with, nor do we endorse, any viewpoint on alcoholism except our own. But Tradition Six becomes blurred when people see church, health, and A.A. publications all stacked together.

How about taking a look at your group's literature display at the next meeting? Pretend you are absolutely new. What impression of A.A. does the literature display give you?



“When, in 1955, the AA groups confirmed the permanent charter for their General Service Conference, they thereby delegated to the Conference complete authority for the active maintenance of our world services and thereby made the Conference—excepting for any change in the Twelve Traditions or in Article 12 of

the Conference Charter—the actual voice and the effective conscience of our whole society.”

Bill W. and Dr. Bob, entrusted by the early groups to get the program going and to spread the message, found non-alcoholic friends to help them. They formed a trusteeship and delegated to it the responsibility for finances, the Big Book and other lit-

erature, public information, the service office and the A.A. Grapevine. However, as the trustees constantly looked to the co-founders for advice and guidance and the groups also continued to hold them accountable, it was evident that the leadership should be transferred to the AA groups as

 a whole. But if the groups were to carry on their primary purpose, they would have to delegate their Leadership to a General Service Conference. They do this by electing a General Service Representative (GSR) for each group. The GSRs meet regularly in area assemblies and every two years elect delegates from among their numbers. Every April, the delegates from the 93 areas in the US and Canada meet for six days with the trustees of the General Service Board, the staffs of the General Service Office (GSO) and the AA Grapevine and certain other service workers. Thus, this General Service Conference of AA is “the actual voice and effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs.”

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TRADITION II

“For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience.” Every AA group follows this same cycle of development. We are coming to realize that each group, as well as each individual, is a special entity, not quite like any other. Though AA groups are basically the same, each group does have its own special atmosphere, its own peculiar state of development. We believe that every AA group has a conscience. It is the collective conscience of its own membership. Daily experience informs and instructs his conscience. The group begins to recognize its own defects of character and, one by one, these are removed or lessened. As this process continues, the group becomes better able to receive right direction for its own affairs. Trial and error produces group experience and out of corrected experience comes custom. When a customary way of doing things is definitely proved to be best, then that custom forms into AA Tradition. The Greater Power is then working through a clear group conscience.

After a rousing and informative hour with our new Panel 62 Delegate, Jeryl T., committee meetings and a delicious lunch, the assembly got underway with the seating of the new Panel 62 officers: Jeryl T. (Delegate), Sharon K. (Alt. Delegate), Cesar F. (Chair), Annie D. (Treasurer), Jesus O. (Secretary), and Raul C. (Registrar).

Hosted by District 5 and held at the Elks Club of Santa Ana, **215 members** signed in to participate in the assembly.

After readings and introductions, many **new Panel 62 District Committee Members and Chairs**, plus **new General Service Representatives** introduced themselves and were welcomed by the assembly.

Items on the agenda for consideration began with Assembly **ratification of Standing Committee Chairs and Co-Chairs**. The new **Area Roster**, with all names, addresses and other information will be published soon and will be available to all members of the Area through the Literature Committee.

The Panel 60 Treasurer presented the **2012 Area budget** for consideration and, after questions and discussion, the motion to accept the budget was passed by a substantial majority vote.


The next item of business was a proposal that an **Audit Committee** be created and added to the MSCA Bylaws and Guidelines under the heading of “Special Committees”, and that the MSCA Assembly adopt the proposed Purpose and Procedures for that committee. The Purpose and Procedures were handed out at the last two Area Service Committee meetings as well as this assembly for review and discussion. After discussion and questions, the proposal was passed by a substantial majority vote.

The final item on the agenda was from the Archives Standing Committee which recommended that MSCA enter into a **lease agreement** with the [current landlord] for the property located at 7111 Arlington Ave., Suite B, in Riverside [which is the home of the MSCA Archives Repository and meeting place]. The MSCA Archivist, Pete B., explained the extremely favorable terms (50 cents per square foot with no increase for the term of the lease) and answered questions from members. After discussion, the proposal was passed unanimously.

A floor action was proposed by the Archivist to incorporate a further “sweetening” of the lease which had been offered after the last Area Service Committee meeting to extend the lease at a 3% increase in rent for an additional year. The motion was seconded and after brief discussion, passed unanimously.

There was then a report from the **4-Area District Committee Member Sharing Workshop** to be held 4 Area DCM Sharing Session at St. Innocent Orthodox Church at 5657 Lindley Ave Tarzana, CA 91356 on Saturday, February 11th. MSCA will provide translation equipment, two moderators and two recorders for roundtable discussions. The 4 Area DCM Sharing Session gives DCMs from Areas 05, 08, 09 and 93 an opportunity to share service information and experiences. All past, present and future DCMs, DCMCs and alternates are invited (in other words, all interested in General Service). Hosted this year by Area 93.

**Panel 62 & Tradition 2 in
Area 09

As we begin a new year, I am eternally hopeful about the future of the Mid-Southern California Area (MSCA09). Alcoholics Anonymous is by far the most precious thing in my life; I love A.A. with all my heart. My gratitude for the Groups throughout our Area is beyond words. Other than about a year in a neighboring Area, my entire sobriety has taken place within the boundaries of Area 09.

Some of my thoughts as Panel 62 gets underway include service, something *“that we are actually to practice [with] a genuine humility”* (Tradition 12), and rotation.

It seems to me that the tail has been wagging the dog in our Area. Groups are not properly informed and they often do not seem to be the guiding entity. A small group of people seem to have taken the lead and are trying to implement what they believe is best for the rest of us. This is very concerning, and I think it is time for us to figure out how to have our Groups determine what is best and then tell us how they wish for us to proceed. After all, are not we sup-

The **Standing Committee** chairs each gave short reports, as did the **District Committee** Chairs. Most committees are just getting settled with new members and will have more activities to share at the next area meeting. The Communications Committee announced that they are discussing the possibility of adding **audio vignettes** of service talks to the MSCA website and are forming a group of volunteers to coordinate use of the area’s leased copier; DCM school discussed visitation strategies and formed a **DCM/ DCMC email list** to encourage sharing experience between meetings; Grapevine Committee reported that there have been 28 subscriptions as a result of the **“Victor E” challenge** for each area to get at least 67 print subscriptions (if all areas got that number, the Grapevine would be self-supporting); Literature Committee is working on the **area roster**; Special Needs noted that Alan F., from District 4, along with other enthusiastic members, have launched **two meetings for the deaf** in Long Beach and an article about the way this came about is scheduled to be published in the February Grapevine.

Although the time was short, the Chair encouraged the districts to give reports. A few highlights are: **District 6** had a game show entitled: “Who Wants to be a Committee Chair Millionaire?” and filled every committee position! **District 9** is looking at how many people they will be able to send to the Pacific Regional AA Service Assembly (PRAASA) in Bellevue, Washington in March; **District 10** also had a game show: “Big Book Jeopardy” which everyone enjoyed; **District 12** reported that they had 61 members plus 4 guests at their January meeting; **District 18** DCMC reported that he is so devoted to service that he recently married woman from District 6 so he could keep in touch.

January birthdays ranged from one GSR celebrating his first year and a past delegate celebrating 32 years this month.

The meeting was closed with the Responsibility Statement in Spanish and English.

The next Area Assembly will be on **Sunday, May 20th in District 1**

posed to be their trusted servants? I am personally weary of some of our individual members trying to get the rest of us to follow their desires, even if their intentions are pure. We need the Groups to start stepping up and we also need more transparency. We need to encourage our Groups to take the initiative when it comes to how we operate. The best way for us to do this is to make sure that our GSRs and DCMs are properly informed and communicate effectively between our Groups, Districts, and the Area.

As for rotation, I would like to see us implement some parameters for ensuring the enthusiasm and passion that comes from encouraging more participating by

I would like to see us limit the # of Area Officer positions a person can serve on to only 2 consecutive panels. When one person goes from being our Chair to Treasurer to Secretary to _____, I believe they are robbing others of the opportunity to step up.

After serving as an Officer on 2 consecutive panels, I believe each individual should then only be able to stand for the Delegate position as often as they want. Also, if you have had the opportunity to serve as our Delegate, please stick around! Make yourself available as a Service Sponsor, or simply as an "elder statesman" in the back of the room. Answer questions based upon your experience, express your opinions on pertinent topics; but please, please rotate on so as to allow newer members their turn.

Thanks for letting me share some of my thoughts on topics that are close to my heart. I hope I have not ruffled any feathers. I am not directing these comments at anyone in particular. I am simply sharing what I believe will help us to do our best at being of service to our Area and therefore to each member, group and AA as a whole.

This committee receives any suggestions for changes in the Conference Charter and makes recommendations on them. This committee has no corresponding trustees' committee.

Our Panel 62 Delegate, Jeryl T., has been assigned to the Report and Charter Committee, and, one might ask, how are the delegate's chosen for committee assignments?

The answer is found on page S59 of the 2010-2011 Service Manual: "Committee members are selected by lot in December by one or two members of the trustees' Conference and the Conference Coordinator. The names of new delegates are drawn from the hat to replace outgoing delegates on each committee." The only exception to the random selection is if, by chance, the committee selected is the same as the previous delegate from the same area, another selection will be made.
