General Service Keeps a Newcomer Sober

Ronnie O. sat on the back row of his first AA meeting on a Saturday night in Wrightwood, California on 9 February 2008. It had been 24 hours since his last drink. Introducing himself as a newcomer near the beginning of the meeting, I approached him afterwards and asked if he sincerely wanted to stay sober. Not waiting for an answer, I offered to pick him up the next morning and transport him to an Area 09 Service Committee meeting in Indio. I could only promise that he would not drink between 6 a.m. when I picked him up and 6 p.m. when I dropped him off.

Then a new GSR, I was somewhat surprised when he said yes and even more surprised when he was standing in his front yard the next morning shortly after sunrise. I cautioned that this would not be a "typical" AA meeting but that he was guaranteed not to drink sitting there in my backseat and later mingling with other southern California alcoholics. Along the way I picked up my service sponsor, John W., in Hesperia and the three of us proceeded to make the three-hour drive to Indio. We had the meeting-before-the-meeting during the drive.

Once there, Ronnie was introduced to AA at the Area-level. There were a hundredand-fifty alcoholics in one large room, amplifying chaotic conversations occurring in both English and Spanish. When one can't hear, one speaks louder, which feeds on itself and is overwhelming at first. Of all the AA-related functions I've attended, it is AA at the Area-level that seems to best demonstrate our 9th Tradition. I continue to be amazed (and pleased) at how we always get things done even in the face of all the seeming lack of organization! How several hundred alcoholics somehow end up at the right committee tables even when there are no signs to announce who is meeting where was disconcerting at first and is now something I've come to appreciate.

Ronnie was introduced to several District 19 folks, who in typical AA fashion made him feel at home. Then several other alcoholics welcomed him when they learned that he was a newcomer thrust into Area-level bedlam. It may not have been as cozy as a group of a dozen faithful AA's sitting on couches in someone's home but there was every indication that he felt right at home surrounded by a hundred trusted servants. It's sometimes difficult to see the similarities between an AA home group and an Area-level group; however, whenever two alcoholics get together it doesn't seem to matter where.

The 14 February 2010 ASC hosted by District 11 marks two years since we attended that meeting. Having held his mouth right (i.e., not in a circle near a glass hole), Ronnie celebrated two years on 8 February 2010. Although he has never revisited an Area-level meeting, he is a dedicated member of Alcoholics Anonymous and makes his home group in Phelan, California. I've told this story to a half-dozen alcoholics as evidence that AA working at even the Area level can be an effective way of beginning a new sober life. Now, it's a pleasure to share this story with the entire Area. You just never know how first impressions can lead to lasting sobriety! Even in large crowds, it continues to be one alcoholic caring enough to carry the message to another alcoholic who no longer wants to suffer that has worked for 75 years and continues to do so!
